### about us

#### DEARBORN COUNTY SOLID WASTE MANAGEMENT DISTRICT

The Dearborn County Solid Waste Management District, also known as the Dearborn County Recycling Center or DCRC, is located in Aurora, Indiana. This facility serves as the operation's hub for recycling collection, as well as holds the Drive-Thru, Household Hazardous Waste collection, and Creation Station, which includes Costume Swap, ReProm, and the newest program, the Lending Station. From this hub, fifteen 24/7 recycling drop-off locations around Dearborn County are serviced, as well as recycling collection from 19 schools and close to 200 small businesses in the county.

2021 marked the DCRC's 28th year as a solid waste district and 17 years as a collection and processing facility for recycling. It continues to be the only entity within Dearborn County that accepts televisions for recycling, as well as the only collection point for household hazardous waste.

Our efforts are continually focused on reducing the amount of waste being sent to landfills through reduction, reuse, and recycling programs.



recycling locations

The DCRC owns and operates 16 source-separated recycling trailers, with one or two trailers located at 14 of the sites listed below 24 hours a day, seven days a week. Plastics-only collection trailers are also available at 3 locations: the Aurora Lions Club, Lawrenceburg, and Bright Elementary School.

Toward the end of 2021, the DCRC added three cardboard-only collection containers to Bright Meadows, North Dearborn, and St. Leon. The DCRC has contracted with Rumpke Recycling to have a 30-yard commingled recycling container at the St. Leon location. Based on usage, the trailers are emptied on regularly scheduled days each week.

The diversion rate is the percentage of waste diverted away from landfills. While the weights of all recyclables are not captured in the table to the left due to limitations of data collection from private industry, this picture gives a fair representation of the County's waste and recycling picture as a whole. Dearborn County's diversion rate for 2021 is 8%.

Two waste haulers, Best Way and Rumpke, offer private trash hauling services in Dearborn County. Greendale and Lawrenceburg have their own sanitation departments and haul waste for their respective cities; both haul their waste to the Best Way Transfer Station in Greendale. Greendale offers single-stream curbside recycling to its residents and Lawrenceburg offers corrugated cardboard collection to its businesses and curbside recycling to its residents. Both haul their materials to Rumpke in Cincinnati for processing.

### education programs






Programs in 2021 were slightly different from other years. Due to COVID, some schools were not allowing visitors to enter, and many events were canceled or scaled back. Educational efforts were shifted to outdoor and virtual programs for students. Advertising via social media and local newspaper outlets continued to be a great outlet for community and adult education.

Overall, 1,391 students and 818 adults participated in the DCRC's education and outreach programs.

#### 2021 sessions



Classroom sessions are always higher than other types of sessions because there are almost always multiple sessions for each day spent at a school.

The Program Sessions by Title table to the left shows how many sessions of each program were completed. While the sessions were down from previous typical years, the DCRC was still excited to be back in the schools for programming. Worm Composting was the most popular program in part because it is used for the Ag Days event, serving all county 3rd graders.

Program sessions for Kindergarten through 2nd grade made up 35% of the total while 3rd through 5th was 53% and 6th through 12th accounted for 12%.





Outreach efforts in 2021 included a Community Shred Day, a mobile electronics collection in Bright, a booth at the Dearborn County 4-H Fair, the Lawrenceburg Farmers' Market, CASA Teen Halloween and a tire collection event.



The DCRC partnered with the North Dearborn Library in April for a Community Shred Day. Student volunteers from Harrison Middle School Junior Honor Society helped remove items from the cars. The DCRC also donated items for a bird feeder craft that was done inside the library.

The DCRC strives to make its services as convenient as possible to the population it serves. In 2021, a mobile electronics collection was held in Bright at the old North Dearborn Elementary School. One hundred forty customers were served at this remote location where 83 televisions and 5,656 pounds of computers and miscellaneous electronics were collected.

The Dearborn County 4-H and Community Fair is always time well-spent out and about in the community, meeting with residents as well as people from the surrounding communities. The Fair was slightly scaled back from other years but was still a success. The Fair was the third week in June and was open Monday through Saturday evenings. The DCRC had a total of 574 visitors over the six days, with 249 students, and 325 adults. A hand-shaped chair and recycling bins were awarded as prizes.

The DCRC also had a booth at the Lawrenceburg Farmers' Market during two different weekends in September. A DCRC representative handed out reusable bags and literature about the DCRC services. The booth was time well-spent in the community, meeting with residents as well as people from the surrounding communities. Although our recycling services only cover Dearborn County, we work with other industry leaders like Rumpke to provide consistent messaging regarding recycling.

The DCRC was invited to pass out candy at the 2nd Annual Dearborn County Youth Ambassadors Teen Halloween Night at Tanners Creek Boat Ramp.

#### creation station

Creation Station is Dearborn County's reuse center and one of the greatest local resources for non-profit organizations. This program would not be successful without generous donations from the community. Individuals and businesses donate items they no longer need but are still usable and helpful to others. Creation Station has a large assortment of office, educational, school and craft supplies to offer teachers, church leaders, 4-H leaders, Scout leaders, and other non-profit groups. Customers comment on a regular basis how Creation Station has saved them and their nonprofit organizations a lot of money. Creation Station hours were increased two hours per week in 2021, and it is now open on Wednesdays from 1-6 pm. There were 301 customers in 2021 and 7751 pounds of material disbursed, not including deliveries from Creation Station to the teachers which are listed below. Since 2004, the Creation Station has diverted close to 68 tons of material from the landfill!

#### school delivery program

The School Delivery Program just finished its fifth year. This program was put in place to help teachers and staff that are unable to visit Creation Station during open hours. Deliveries are made to teachers in up to 17 different Dearborn County schools once a month during the school year based on e-mailed requests. Deliveries were made to an average of 36 teachers and 14 schools per month. There was a total of 322 deliveries made totaling 3748 pounds in the nine months that school was in session in 2021.

#### costume swap

Costume Swap is one of the District's biggest reuse programs. This is an exchange program with over 1000 costumes available for exchange. There is also a lot of makeup, accessories, and Halloween decorations. 2021 still followed several of the guidelines used the previous year which allowed social distancing and crowd control. A lot of new costumes and decor were donated from a local business at the end of the Halloween season to be used for next year's swap. Customers who did not have a costume to trade gave a donation. Donations to Costume Swap totaled \$1,316. There was a total of 720 customers that used Costume Swap in 2021.

### reuse programs

#### reprom

ReProm is the District's formal dress exchange program which started in 2012 with about a dozen dresses and has grown to about 1200 dresses. Many girls purchase a dress and wear it one time. This exchange program allows girls to bring in a dress they do not plan on wearing again and swap it for one that is new to them. This program saves families money as it cuts down on the expense of the Prom. It also gives these formal dresses a chance to be worn again instead of hanging in the closet for years never to be used again. ReProm is open all year on Wednesdays from 1-6 pm for all types of formal events with special dates and times around Prom time. Appointments were required all year. Girls who did not have a dress to exchange gave a donation. In 2021 a total of \$1,638 in donations were received. ReProm had an impressive 435 visitors considering many annual events still did not happen in 2021.



2021 was our third Holiday Giveaway. Since it was canceled in 2020, there were two years worth of donations to give away. Thanks to the help from several volunteers and employees, the warehouse was turned into a huge holiday and craft shop. In just three days, 555 customers took holiday and craft supplies home totaling 4,660 pounds including 31 Christmas trees. Holiday items are collected in the Drive-Thru throughout the year for this event. Many individuals and nonprofit organizations enjoyed getting holiday decorations thanks to the Holiday Giveaway. Most of these items would have otherwise ended up in the landfill.

#### lending station

This program can be used for weddings, graduation parties, showers, and other special events. It has a variety of glassware, table coverings, and decorations in multiple quantities. Lending Station is constantly growing with new donations giving people a larger variety to choose from for their special occasion. This program was used for 12 different events in 2021. The inventory can be found on our website at dearborncountyrecycles.com.







### improvements and awards



#### creation station grant

The Dearborn Community Foundation, Inc. (DCF) awarded \$1,000 to the Dearborn County Solid Waste Management District from the Board Member Proactive Grants Program for the Recycling Center's Creation Station. Jim Stock, a retired educator and DCF board member visited Creation Station and made the recommendation for the grant to the board.

The funds were used to supplement the resources available to educators and non-profit groups in Dearborn County. During November school deliveries, teachers were surveyed on what type of items they need for their classrooms. The funds from the grant were used to purchase those additional items. Most items that are donated to Creation Station are donated in a limited amount. Having this grant allowed the District to supply teachers with some items that are not usually donated.

#### recycling market development grant

The DCRC was a 2020 recipient of the Indiana Department of Environmental Management Recycling Market Development Grant, The grant money was used to purchase three new recycling drop-off containers that are dedicated to corrugated cardboard. The funding for the grant was received in 2021. The containers arrived in October and were placed at North Dearborn, Bright Meadows Park, and St. Leon. The locations were chosen due to the high volume of recycling at those locations.



### employee milestones

#### joe dittmer

The DCRC celebrated Joe Dittmer's 10th anniversary on January 6th! This milestone is shadowed by the fact that Joe spent 30 years at Cincinnati Incorporated, where

he built machines. Joe has brought years of valuable experience to the DCRC processing facility. When asked what he likes most about his job, Joe replied that he likes the camaraderie of the employees at the DCRC, as well as feeling like he is contributing to the betterment of the community. Like Joe, the majority of employees at the DCRC are retired from other occupations, bringing experience and dedication to the workplace while continuing the use of their skills. In his spare time, Joe enjoys spending time with his grandchildren, as well as cutting wood.

#### mike teaney

The DCRC celebrated Mike Teaney's 10th anniversary on September 6th. Mike spent over 36 years at Tanner's Creek I&M, where he ran tractors in the coal yard, worked on barges and was a welder. After Mike retired from 1&M, he spent 5 years working for Hollywood Casino (originally Argosy Casino) as a slot machine attendant. Since Mike joined the DCRC, he has been a skid steer operator, drive-thru attendant, worked in processing, and currently drives routes for our residential trailers. Mike's favorite part of the DCRC is celebrating birthdays for employees, and the homemade desserts that come with those celebrations. Mike is married and enjoys spending his free time traveling and camping with his wife, two daughters, and 4 grandchildren.
